If you own and occupy your home as a primary residence prior to November 1, 2013, you may be entitled to an exempt from local school operating taxes. If you no longer own and occupy the property as your primary residence and are currently receiving the exemption, it should be rescinded. The Principal Residence Exemption appears on your Winter Tax Bill which will be in the mail by December 1st.

Please check your tax bill as soon as you receive it to be sure the Principal Residence Exemption is correct. If your PRE is incorrect it can xbe corrected at the December Board of Review and a new tax bill can be issued. Please contact me for any questions concerning assessments and principle residence eligibility requirements.

For your convenience when paying your winter tax bills in 2013, my office will be open December 30th and 31st from 9am to 6pm. I will also be open the last two days, Feb. 27th and 28th, 2014 from 9am to 6pm. You may call me anytime to make appointments. I am generally in the office every day a couple of hours to answer phone calls and make appointments. Enjoy the fall season!

BUILDING INSPECTOR, Kevin P. Varner

Fall is here and there are still a few things to do before you can grab that gun for hunting and a map for the color tours.

We hope you are properly planning your next project or new home. If you are going to be building a new home, "Thank You" for choosing Homer Township, we warmly welcome you to If you need a worksheet, our community. checklist and permit application to guide you through this simple process, please contact me so you can proceed without getting into untimely delays. The forms are also available online at homertownship.org, click on Fees and Applications, print off both the Requirements and the Application, fill them out and then contact me. New requirements for dwellings and additions have been installed this new code cycle (2009 edition and the latest version of the Energy Code) so please contact me or your design professional for these updates and verifications.

As I have stated before, permits are very important for your building progress in Homer Township. If your project is a deck or utility barn under 200 sq ft., you will not need a building permit- but please be sure to check on the zoning setbacks. *Anything and everything else* needs a Building Permit: Demolition of any kind to a structure, Pools, Ponds. and Lean-to's. It may fall under the *No Charge* category, but you still need to pursue one.

How do you know if you need a permit? Contact me please, I will return your call, fax or e-mail as soon as I can. For electrical, plumbing or heating questions, call the appropriate inspector to clarify your specific issues. The call is cheap compared to the double fee and a citation charge of construction fraud filed against you for proceeding without a permit. Please, believe me when I say we (all the inspectors) are on your side so that the project will proceed smoothly without delays and problems. Our office is located in the Township Hall on the corner of E. Olson Road and N. Homer Road. Thank you, we are looking forward to assisting you!

FIRE CHIEF, John Hanson

As summer turns to fall, it is time to start thinking about the upcoming heating season. Following are some things to think about. This is not an all inclusive list:

Home Hazards: Living Room

- Make sure fireplace flues are clean and dampers work properly
- Keep flammable materials at least three feet from heating devices
- If you have an open faced fireplace, use a fire place screen
- Install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors on every floor and in all rooms used for sleeping
- Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and replace batteries every six months
- Turn off space heaters when you leave the room, space heaters are not intended for long term use
- Do not overload power strips
- Keep candles at least two feet from flammable materials, and do not leave them unattended
- Never leave a burning cigarette unattended

Home Hazards: Bedroom

- NEVER smoke in bed
- Don't run extension cords under rugs
- NEVER use candles in bedrooms
- Anyone dependant on a walker or wheelchair should sleep on the ground floor
- Install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in every room used for sleeping

Home Hazards: Kitchen

- Keep a multiuse fire extinguisher in a place where it is easy to access
- Limit distractions such as computer, TV or phones
- Never leave anything on the stove or under the broiler unattended
- Turn the handles of pans inward so children cannot grab them

- Smother oven fires by turning off the appliance and keeping the door closed or lid on pans
- NEVER attempt to fight a fire that spreads quickly or won't go out. Close the door, leave the house and call the fire department from outside

Home Hazards: Basement

- Clean your dryer filter after every load and check around the drum and back for lint or lost laundry
- Have your heating system inspected and serviced once a year BEFORE cold weather begins
- Keep areas around heating sources clear of debris
- Do not store flammable fuels inside your residence
- Do not store flammable or combustible materials under stairways

New Fire Engine

The township board, after much work and research, approved the purchase on May 15th. The engine is being purchased from Front Line Services in Freeland at a cost \$487,405.00. Several firefighters went to the factory to finalize the specifications in May. The chassis will be completed in mid-October, and then it will be shipped to the factory for completion in late April.





WEBSITE NEWS, Sandra Simmons, Website Coordinator

The Township Website (*homertownship.org*) is beginning to be used by more (but not enough) residents. The current news section is regularly updated, as are the Minutes of the Township Board and the Planning Commission, Open Township positions, Township items for sale, and Township bids for work are examples of other items that have been posted. The most frequently accessed pages are: Meeting Minutes, Contact List, Ordinances, Hall Rental, Cemetery, Permits, Current News, For Sale, Links, Newsletter and Fire Department.



The new "Township Alert" system has also been functioning for almost a year. While the number of those participating has slightly increased, it still represents a very small percentage of residents. This is the only way we can notify residents in a timely manner of actions or events that affect you. Those signed up for this alert receive an e-mail notice of important news and are provided a direct link to the topic. This system has been used several times and will be used more in the future to notify residents of Board/Commission actions, community events and other matters of significance to the township and residents.



PLANNING COMMISSION NOTES, Sandra Simmons, Chairperson

The major focus of the Planning Commission this year has been the updating of the Township Master Plan which was last done 15 years ago. The Master Plan makes projections for land use for the coming 10-20 years and is to be reviewed and updated as needed every 5 years. This Plan then serves as a base for making all future land use decisions. It identifies our plans for future land use and does not affect current zoning. This is a lengthy process spelled out by state law. We have been making every attempt possible to inform and involve the township residents in this process as it affects all of us. Notices of meetings, a resident survey and updates have been and will continue to be posted on the township website and available in print form in the township hall for review. Unfortunately, only a very small percentage of residents (.02%) have provided input thus far. The input that has been provided has been extremely helpful and insightful and is providing the direction the Township Planning Commission and Board of Trustees is following. These results are also available on the Township Website and in print form at the Township Hall. Following review and discussion of these materials, a draft of our proposed revised Master Plan will be presented at an open house for public review and input.

This meeting will occur sometime late this year or early next year. Check the website and/or sign up for the Township Alert System so you don't miss the meeting, then please attend and provide input. In the meantime you may review the planning commission minutes/meeting dates on the Township Website.

Join Chippewa Nature Center (CNC) for Fall Harvest Festival (FHF),

CNC's biggest event of the year on Saturday, October 5 from 10 am-4 pm. Visitors will enjoy demonstrations, crafts and activities that reflect 19th century life on the farm at harvest time.

Members and all children under 18 are admitted free. Non-member adults pay just \$5!

- In the Visitor Center, you'll find folk music, quilting demonstrations and more. New this year, you can purchase items from Lavender Fleece Farm & Studio and Saverine Creek Heirlooms and baskets by Nancy Carlson. Also check out the Nature Center Store, Ecosystem Gallery, Nature Discovery Area and River Overlook. Before riding the hay wagon to the Homestead. visit the wigwam, where traditional skills expert Jim Miller will be working on an autumn project.
- At the Homestead, enjoy demonstrations of woodcarving, herb-craft, woodstove cooking, woodworking, cider making, beekeeping, apple butter making, spinning and weaving wool, natural dyes and traditional music. Children can make rope, stamp leather, dip candles, stencil, grind corn and more! At the

garden, learn about organic heirloom vegetables grown this year at the Homestead. Food concessions will be provided by the Studley Grange.



Near the Wagon Barn, watch teams of Belgian horses plow the field and see the antique threshing machine thresh grain grown this year at CNC.


